Chapter 1: Unleashing Your Leadership Potential

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, And before you were born I consecrated you; I have appointed you as a prophet to the nations." (Jeremiah 1:5)

Leadership begins with the understanding that God has set you apart for a purpose. True leadership is not about titles or authority but about the willingness to serve and follow God's guidance, even when the path ahead is uncertain. The foundation of Kingdom leadership lies in a deep sense of calling and a commitment to serve others as Christ did.

God's Call to Leadership

Throughout Scripture, we see God calling ordinary people to accomplish extraordinary tasks. This pattern reminds us that leadership is not about qualifications but about willingness and obedience to God's call.

Consider:

- **Moses**, an exiled shepherd who doubted his ability to speak effectively yet became God's instrument for liberating the Israelites.
- **Esther**, a young woman of courage, who risked her life to save her people.
- **David**, a simple shepherd boy, anointed as king because of his heart for God rather than his stature or experience.

Leadership often begins in unlikely places, and God's call frequently requires us to step out of our comfort zones. Like Moses, Esther, and David, God often calls unlikely leaders. My own journey is an example of this. I was raised in a hippie household in San Francisco in the 1960s. I gave my life to Jesus while hitchhiking around the United States at the age of 18. I joined a church-planting ministry that did on-the-job training, and I returned to San Francisco in 1977 as a minister in training. Immediately, I was thrust into new and challenging levels of leadership.

I launched a business and helped establish "ministry houses" that cared for the homeless young people arriving to experience the Summer of Love. After a couple of years, our lead pastor approached me with a challenge: **"Whatever is in your heart to do for Jesus, go for it!"** It was in my heart to see the Body of Christ come together in unity. So as a 22-year-old leader, I reached out to every pastor in the city with an invitation to join me for a multi-church worship event in Golden Gate Park. Imagine a long-haired, scruffy-chinned 22-year-old approaching leaders twice my age with a vision! I felt inadequate and insecure, but I was confident that God was guiding me. About a dozen pastors joined in.

The final pastor I spoke to agreed to join us on the condition that I would accompany him for an evangelistic outreach a few weeks later. I reluctantly consented, and this led to the formation of a ministry called *SOS San Francisco*, led by a coalition of pastors and evangelists, mobilizing thousands of people to preach the gospel in the ensuing years. Although I was never the principal leader of this ministry, my small step of obedience served as a catalyst for something great that God accomplished.

These stories illustrate that God equips those He calls. **Moses was given signs and words, Esther found favor with the king, and David's time tending and defending sheep prepared him for battles ahead.** Likewise, my journey—from a young leader with little experience to a minister whose obedience led to a citywide movement—demonstrates that God's call is not dependent on our ability but on our willingness to step forward. As you reflect on your leadership journey, remember that your calling is not about being fully prepared—it is about being available to God, trusting that He will equip you for the task ahead.

The Heart of a Leader

At the core of Kingdom leadership is a heart aligned with God's purposes. Jesus modeled servant leadership, washing His disciples' feet and laying down His life for others. This act wasn't just about humility but about demonstrating the selfless love that should characterize all leaders. To lead well, a Kingdom leader must:

- **Serve Others:** Leadership is about lifting others up, helping them grow, and sacrificing personal gain for collective success.
 - Running house ministries in the inner city of San Francisco was not easy. Every day, we worked jobs and gave 100% of our income to support the ministry. Each evening, we opened our home to those referred to us. We fed them, led Bible studies, gave them a place to sleep, and sent them off in the morning before going to work ourselves. We modeled this lifestyle after the early Christians in the Book of Acts. Through this time of consistent service, God transformed me from a self-centered young man into a leader willing to lay down his life for others.
- **Seek God's Will:** Regular prayer and immersion in Scripture help leaders stay grounded in God's vision rather than their own ambitions. During those years, I fasted and prayed about my calling, and God began to reveal my God-given destiny through prayer, Scripture study, and the counsel of wise leaders.
- **Lead by Example:** Actions speak louder than words, and leaders set the tone for those they influence. As I reflect on my leadership journey over the last 48 years, I remember the words of the Apostle Paul: **"I have not attained, nor am I already perfect, but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus also laid hold of me."** (Philippians 3:12)

 - When Diane and I married, I never imagined our family would grow to include seven amazing sons and daughters. With such a large family, growing in leadership was mandatory. In the beginning, God created family as the original governing force on the earth. Every other form of government and leadership followed family, and family remains the most influential shaping force in a person's life.
- **Workplace Influence:** Demonstrating integrity, kindness, and excellence in your professional role inspires others and reflects God's character.
 - Most of us spend a significant percentage of our lives at our jobs. Regardless of your role, you are called to influence and lead in the workplace.

- **Community Impact:** Using your time and resources to serve and uplift those in need shows God's love in action.
 - As followers of Jesus, we have a unique responsibility to represent Him in every relationship and endeavor. This is the foundation of leadership.

Each of these areas offers opportunities to lead with intentionality and purpose. How might you better reflect God's Kingdom in your current spheres of influence?

Chapter 2: Identity: The Foundation of Leadership

"But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession, so that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9)

Understanding your identity in Christ is foundational to Kingdom leadership. As leaders, our confidence, clarity, and calling stem from knowing who we are in Him and who He is in us. When we ground ourselves in Christ, we operate not from a place of striving but from a place of security.

Rooted in Identity

The journey of leadership begins with understanding that our identity is not determined by our performance, achievements, or roles, but by our relationship with Christ. Many leaders wrestle with imposter syndrome or feelings of inadequacy, but Scripture reminds us that we are fearfully and wonderfully made (*Psalms 139:14*). Our identity is rooted in God's unchanging truths:

- **You are chosen:** God has handpicked you for His purposes (*Ephesians 1:4*).
- **You are loved:** His love is unconditional and steadfast (*Romans 8:38-39*).
- **You are equipped:** He has given you gifts and abilities to fulfill your calling (*2 Peter 1:3*).

When leaders embrace these truths, they can lead with authenticity and courage.

One of the most prevalent crimes in current culture is called "**identity theft**." This is also a crime in the spiritual realm. The enemy is constantly at work to undermine your confidence and courage as a leader. Many times as a young business leader and as a growing pastor, I experienced this identity theft as a result of criticism, mistakes, or disappointing circumstances. In times like these, we must strengthen ourselves in the Lord and in the truth of Scripture.

Breaking Free from Orphan Thinking

Orphan thinking is a mindset of scarcity, fear, and self-reliance. It's the belief that we must earn God's approval or prove our worth through our actions. This mindset often leads to burnout and insecurity. In contrast, Kingdom leaders operate with the mindset of an **adopted child**:

- **Belonging:** Knowing you are part of God's family gives you security (*Romans 8:15*).
- **Provision:** Trusting that God will supply all your needs allows you to lead boldly (*Philippians 4:19*).
- **Purpose:** Understanding your role in His Kingdom plan gives you direction.

To transition from orphan thinking to Kingdom thinking, reflect on these truths:

- You are **fully accepted** by God.
- You have **nothing to prove and nothing to lose**.
- Your worth is not tied to what you do but to **who you are in Christ**.

Chapter 3: Mastering Self-Leadership

Before a leader can effectively guide others, they must first lead themselves. Self-leadership involves understanding your strengths and weaknesses, cultivating discipline, and pursuing personal growth. It requires a commitment to aligning your character and actions with God's purposes.

The Importance of Self-Leadership

Self-leadership is the foundation of all other leadership. As leaders, we set the tone for those we influence. How we manage ourselves impacts how others perceive us and follow our example. Biblical leadership prioritizes:

- **Integrity:** Walking in alignment with God's truth, both publicly and privately.

Throughout my years of ministry, there were times and seasons when I was challenged to assess myself in light of the call of God. Some of these challenges came from circumstances, some from friends and coworkers, and some directly from the Holy Spirit. In every case, my ability to respond required humility. If I found myself making excuses or rejecting constructive input, I would lose the benefit of the lesson that God was trying to teach me.

For example, at the beginning of this year, I engaged in a season of fasting and prayer, and God began to confront me about an area of my heart that was out of sync with His heart. Years ago, I had experienced a serious trial that had hurt me personally and professionally. Instead of processing this pain in the presence of God, I became frustrated and found myself adopting a "victim attitude" and a prideful response. Thankfully, through the conviction of the Holy Spirit, prayer, and Scripture study, I was able to acknowledge my error, turn away from pride, and reconcile myself to God in this situation.

Self-leadership requires an ongoing commitment to humility and a dedication to receiving correction and making the necessary changes to become the leader that God has called you to be.

Spiritual Disciplines for Leaders

Leading yourself requires cultivating spiritual disciplines that keep you connected to God. These include:

1. **Prayer:** Daily communication with God strengthens your dependence on Him.
 2. **Bible Study:** Consistent engagement with Scripture provides wisdom and guidance.
 3. **Sabbath Rest:** Taking time to rest and recharge demonstrates trust in God's provision.

Chapter 4: Spirit-Led Leadership

"Commit your works to the Lord, And your plans will be established." (Proverbs 16:3)

Kingdom leadership is distinct because it operates on the principles of God's Word and reflects His values. It is a calling to influence others for Christ, inspire transformation, and steward resources for His glory. To lead effectively, we must build our leadership on the solid foundation of God's truth and guidance.

The Core Pillars of Kingdom Leadership

1. **The Love of the Father** – Understanding and receiving God's love equips leaders to lead from a place of security and compassion (1 John 4:19).
2. **The Lordship of Christ** – Surrendering to Christ as Lord means aligning leadership decisions with His purposes (Luke 9:23).
3. **The Guidance of the Holy Spirit** – Relying on the Holy Spirit ensures wisdom and discernment in leadership (John 16:13).

These pillars are the anchor points for Kingdom leadership, reminding us that our strength and direction come from God.

Building on the Rock

Jesus taught that a wise builder constructs their house on rock rather than sand (Matthew 7:24-27). Similarly, Kingdom leaders build their influence on unshakable principles. This requires:

- **Time in the Word** – Allowing Scripture to shape your values and actions.
- **Prayerful Decision-Making** – Seeking God's direction before acting.
- **Accountability** – Surrounding yourself with mentors and peers who will encourage and challenge you.

Example from Experience:

Just like a pilot flying through a storm, sometimes we have to trust our instruments rather than what we can see. Our instruments are the timeless truths gleaned from Scripture and a life of practicing God's Word.

During my years as a pastor in San Francisco, we experienced many challenging moments. In the early 1990s, our church grew faster than we could handle, and our need for a new building was overwhelming. We were bursting at the seams with three Sunday morning services in a 400-seat auditorium. Our building search led to many dead ends, but we eventually found a large warehouse with adequate parking. However, the cost was astronomical, and the work required to move in was massive. This challenge led to passionate and persistent prayer. Eventually, we felt confident in moving forward to believe God for the million-dollar upgrade on the building along with the \$17,000 monthly rent. In response, God provided, and we were able to enjoy that facility for almost a full decade.

Change is inevitable in leadership, but how we navigate it determines whether it becomes an obstacle or an opportunity. Kingdom leaders are called to guide their people through transitions with faith, wisdom, and compassion, reflecting the stability of God's promises even in uncertain times.

Understanding the Dynamics of Change

Change often brings discomfort, resistance, and uncertainty, but it also creates opportunities for growth and innovation. As leaders, it is our responsibility to:

- **Anticipate Change:** Stay vigilant and prayerful, asking God for wisdom to foresee shifts and prepare accordingly.
- **Communicate Effectively:** Keep your team informed with clarity and transparency to build trust during transitions.
- **Model Resilience:** Demonstrate courage and faith, showing others that challenges can lead to transformation.

Example in Communication:

During a church restructuring, I held weekly meetings to share updates, provide encouragement, and answer questions. This open dialogue reassured the congregation and encouraged unity.

Trust is the currency of leadership. When trust is undermined through unresolved conflict, past failures, or a lack of healthy transparency, mistrust can easily grow. In times of transition, it is necessary to strengthen relationships by allowing open dialogue. Leaders should encourage those they guide to share their concerns freely, addressing them with honesty, humility, and without defensiveness or retribution.

Biblical Examples of Leadership Through Change

- **Moses:** Led the Israelites out of Egypt, navigating resistance and fear while trusting God’s plan (Exodus 14:13-14).
- **Nehemiah:** Rebuilt the walls of Jerusalem, inspiring people to overcome obstacles through unity and prayer (Nehemiah 4:14).
- **Jesus:** Prepared His disciples for His departure, guiding them to carry on His mission with the promise of the Holy Spirit (John 14:26).

Chapter 6: Visionary Leadership

Visionary leadership is about seeing beyond the present and stepping into the future with faith and clarity. A Kingdom leader does not merely react to circumstances but actively seeks God's blueprint to guide their decisions and inspire those they lead. Visionary leaders align their actions with God's purposes, crafting a path toward meaningful and lasting impact.

The Importance of Vision

Vision is the foundation for purposeful leadership. It clarifies direction, motivates action, and unifies teams. Without vision, leadership lacks focus, and those being led may lose purpose and momentum.

Example in Leadership:

A church leader with a vision for community outreach launched a food pantry, uniting the congregation in prayer, resources, and service. This clarity of purpose not only addressed a pressing need but also strengthened the church's sense of mission.

About ten years into my pastoral season, I had a strong and compelling revelation of the importance of discipleship and training leaders in our church. I knew that many of the challenges we were facing were directly the result of inadequate leadership development priorities. However, my schedule was already filled with Sunday preparation, administrative tasks, and general pastoral duties.

The first step in bringing change to my ministry schedule and the priorities of my staff and volunteer leaders was **vision**. We needed a fresh paradigm for ministry. This began with a reexamination of the life and ministry of Jesus, who spent the majority of His time training a small group to carry on His mission. My team and I studied Scripture and came to a strong conviction to return to Jesus' model of discipleship. Next, we **reverse-engineered** this vision into a set of goals to guide us forward. Eventually, 50% of my work hours were dedicated to developing people and training new leaders. This shift revolutionized our church and continues to be a key focus in my teaching today.

Key Elements of Visionary Leadership:

- **Clarity:** A clear vision provides a roadmap for the journey ahead.
- **Alignment:** A God-inspired vision aligns with His Word and purposes.
- **Inspiration:** Vision inspires others to join in the mission, fostering unity and passion.

Biblical Examples of Visionary Leadership

- **Joseph:** His God-given dreams guided him through betrayal and hardship, ultimately positioning him to save many lives (Genesis 41:39-40). Joseph's ability to interpret dreams and strategize solutions ensured Egypt's survival during famine.
- **Nehemiah:** With a clear vision to rebuild Jerusalem's walls, Nehemiah rallied others to accomplish a seemingly impossible task (Nehemiah 2:17-18). Despite opposition, he inspired unity and perseverance among the people.
- **Paul:** His vision to spread the Gospel drove his missionary journeys, overcoming incredible challenges to plant churches and inspire believers (Acts 16:9-10). Paul's determination and adaptability helped him navigate cultural barriers and opposition to fulfill his mission.

These biblical leaders demonstrate how vision provides direction, strengthens perseverance, and unites people in accomplishing God's purpose.

Chapter 7: Mission-Driven Leadership

"and let's consider how to encourage one another in love and good deeds," (Hebrews 10:24)

Leadership extends beyond individual effort—it's about fostering a culture where others are empowered to lead and thrive. Kingdom leaders understand that their role is not only to guide but to cultivate an environment where leadership is multiplied and rooted in biblical values.

What is a Leadership Culture?

A leadership culture is an ecosystem where leadership principles, practices, and values are modeled, multiplied, sustained and permeate every level of a group or organization. It goes beyond the influence of one individual and becomes the shared ethos that shapes how decisions are made, how people grow, and how missions are fulfilled.

As we began to prioritize discipleship and leadership development in the church we started in San Francisco, a beautiful change took place in its culture. The vision was this: **"Everyone is a mentor, and everyone has a mentor."** This emphasis began to take root, and the results were profound.

- People started to value their personal growth and development in **knowledge, character, and ministry skills**.
- They reached out to **mentors** who could guide them in their developmental process.
- At the same time, they **mentored others**, reinforcing their own learning while helping others grow.
- This not only gave them the **reward of influencing others in a positive direction** but also helped to **anchor the truths** they were learning from others as they were mentoring.

The overall impact was that our church became known as a place where individuals could discover their **personal calling and destiny** while receiving real coaching and support. The result was an increase in new members and an expanding influence throughout **San Francisco**.

- **Shared Vision:** A common understanding of the group's purpose and goals.
- **Empowerment:** Equipping others with the tools, resources, and confidence to lead.
- **Accountability:** Encouraging personal and collective responsibility to uphold values and achieve goals.

- **Moses and the Elders:** When Moses felt overwhelmed by leading Israel, God instructed him to appoint elders who could share the burden of leadership (Numbers 11:16-17). This distributed leadership ensured sustainability and effectiveness.
 - **Outcome:** The shared responsibilities lightened Moses’s load and empowered others to lead effectively.
- **Jesus and the Disciples:** Jesus modeled servant leadership and empowered His disciples to continue His mission, creating a culture of multiplication (Luke 10:1-2).

 - *Likewise, the Early Church carried on this model of shared leadership, reinforcing a culture of generosity and empowerment...*

Each of these leaders invested in others to ensure that the mission continued beyond their own lifetime. Their example calls Kingdom leaders to do the same by training and equipping the next generation.

Real-Life Application

Early in my leadership, I struggled with **morning disciplines and setting my priorities**. But over time, I developed a **structured morning routine** that involved **prayer, scripture, and reflection**. This shift changed not only my **spiritual life** but also my **leadership approach**. When I began mentoring others, I didn’t just **teach leadership principles**; I **modeled a leadership lifestyle** they could follow.
